DR. FU INSPIRES WITH RESEARCH

Recently, the greater UMKC community has caught on to the work that SoNHS Associate Dean of Research, Dr. Mei Fu, is doing right here on the UMKC campus! Over the past months to about a year, Dr. Fu has been conducting research on treating pain associated with lymphedema and has involved faculty and students from the School of Science and Engineering in her experimental research! She has been using SSE's Human Motion Lab to conduct research on specific exercises and movements to see the potential effects they could have for those who suffer from lymphedema. Dr. Fu has been researching lymphedema for over 20 years and continues to push forward to learn more about the condition and how to help!



SCHOLAR OF THE MONTH

Each month, a member of our research faculty is highlighted as a "Scientist/Scholar of the Month". We ask them to share a little about what's going on in their current research. This month's scientist is Dr. Kristin Metcalf-Wilson (pictured left).

This is what she has to say when asked about her research:

1. What is the focus of your program of scholarship/research? Implementation theory, a core component of implementation science, explores how to effectively integrate evidence-based practices into routine use. This field focuses on understanding and facilitating the uptake of research findings into clinical and community settings, aiming to bridge the gap between knowledge and practice.

A critical element of implementation theory is the development and application of frameworks, models, and theories that guide the implementation process. These tools help researchers and practitioners identify and address barriers to implementation, adapt interventions to specific contexts, and assess outcomes effectively.

One prominent example of a model in the implementation process is Lewin's Change Model, developed by Kurt Lewin in 1947. As one of the first psychologists to explore change theory, Lewin proposed a three-stage process: unfreezing, changing, and refreezing. Widely embraced in nursing, this model emphasizes the constant need for change in practice to enhance patient care, healthcare policies, and organizational practices. Using this framework in my work with the Clinical Training Center for Sexual and Reproductive Health enables my team to develop training and technical assistance for the national Title X Family Planning network and ensure access to high quality, evidence-based sexual and reproductive (SRH) services for the clients they serve.

- 2. What has been your most interesting finding? As a Women's Health Nurse Practitioner for over 30 years, I have had the opportunity to practice in (SRH) at many levels. I have provided direct patient services, overseen and managed other clinicians, and worked as an assistant VP of health services. All of these roles have confirmed that keeping up with the latest evidence-based practice is critical for delivering the highest quality SRH services and improving outcomes. Being able to change your practice and apply new knowledge has built a lifetime of learning for me.
- 3. What has been your biggest challenge? Navigating the political landscape within the SRH field is the biggest challenge. Having been in practice since the early 90's it is hard to believe that there are more restrictions on the services I provide now than ever before. It is frustrating to see many communities around the country without basic SRH services. This challenge has kept me involved with health policy efforts at the state and national level.
- 4. What has been your greatest satisfaction? For those that know me it would not be surprising to find out that my greatest satisfaction in my career has been the opportunity to collaborate and build relationships with others in the SRH network. Spending time communicating, sharing stories and solving problems gives me much joy.
