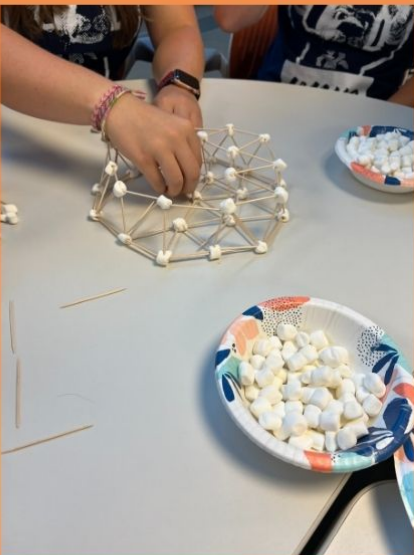
## RECENT COMMUNITY HIGHLIGHTS

## SCIENTIST OF THE MONTH

Scientist of the month is back! Each month, a member of our research faculty is highlighted as a "Scientist of the Month". We ask them to share a little about what's going on in their current research. This month's scientist is **Dr. Sue Lasiter** (pictured left).

"What's new and exciting about delirium research?"

"Approximately 5 million people in the United States (pre-Covid-19) are admitted to intensive care units (ICU) each year and of those admitted to the ICU, up to 87% experience at least one episode of Delirium (Kotfis, K., et al. 2018). The problem with developing ICU delirium is that there are post-ICU syndrome (PICS) symptoms (i.e., cognitive impairment, post-traumatic stress symptoms, anxiety, depression, hospital acquired weakness) that extend far past the event in the ICU and can seriously affect the lives of patients and families long term and increase healthcare costs over time. Given this enormous problem, researchers have been exploring treatments/interventions for delirium both as inpatients and at home, after discharge; thus far, there are no effective treatments for delirium in the ICU or after discharge for PICS. Based on this problem, it seemed logical that if there are no identifiable causes or effective treatments for delirium, that prevention (via prediction) would be a great approach. **I wondered ... what would happen if there were undiscovered predictors of delirium that could be uncovered so we could test focused prevention interventions?** So...our team (S. Chesnut; K Callahan, PhD student; and I) gained funding for this research and extracted data for 20,123 unique patients from electronic medical records to explore 25 under-researched clinical factors that might predict delirium. We are currently analyzing these data...and some factors look very promising!"

# RESEARCH ADVANCEMENTS

Here's this month's updates on research that has been published or grants that have been received by our research faculty and students!

## Faculty Highlights

- **Dr. Mei R Fu** was appointed as the Chair to lead the 2024 Oncology Nursing Foundation (ONF) Major Research Grants. During June and July, Dr. Fu led a group of nationally known experts in oncology nursing to accomplish grant review and complete the recommendations for funding.
- In July 2024, **Dr. Fu** was invited by the Swiss National Science Foundation (SNSF), Switzerland, to serve as expert reviewer for Spark funding scheme. The SNSF aims to enable scientists to develop and test novel and unconventional scientific approaches, methods, theories and ideas which can be developed or tested in a short period of time and with limited resources. The focus lies on the novelty and unconventionality of the proposed research project as well as the scientific quality and potential impact of the project, but not on the specific experience or track record of the applicant.

## Research Highlights

School of Nursing and Health Studies faculty, **Drs. Steven Chesnut, Anita Skarbek, Aimee McDonald, and Mei R Fu** in collaboration with faculty Dr. Karen Landay (First Author) from University of North Texas and Dr. Joseph Richard Schaefer from the University of Mississippi, and Dr. David F Arena from University of Texas-Arlington received the award for Best Paper in the Health Care Management, Hospitality Management, and Public Administration Track (Track 2) by The South Management Associations (SMA) 2024 for their paper entitled, "Let Me Do My Job! How Workload and Organizational Constraints Predict Nurse Turnover Intentions." Celebration will be in person at SMA 2024 in San Antonio, Texas.
